The Nelson City Council Environmental Grants Scheme provides an opportunity to apply for funding to support projects that improve the environment.

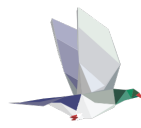
Applications are now open for the first funding round for 2020/21 - applications close on Monday 31 August 2020.

## Nelson Halo group report – Birdlife Centre of New Zealand

This active Halo group is caring for one of our iconic Nelson reserves – the Centre of New Zealand.

The group received an environmental grant from Nelson Nature to buy more traps and increase their trapping network.

Group member Gretchen Holland says:

"June was a busy month for the Birdlife Centre of NZ trapping group. Last month we caught nine possums and 30 rats in our 200 trap network. We've also had a big increase in mice caught or stealing bait without setting off the traps.

Late in June participants in the NMIT Trainee Ranger programme joined us in the reserve to improve access to traps and monitoring tunnels. The Birdlife CoNZ working bee helped make the servicing of traps easier with well-placed steps, removal of woody weeds (barbary and old man's beard) and improving the trapping tracks deep within the reserve."
